

But that should change over the coming months as the Halifax native appears in four films, including a pair of highprofile Canadian movies gracing this year's Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF). Buzz around the 20-year-old actress started after she played a scalpel-wielding teen vigilante in 2005's cult classic Hard Candy. (Director Brett Ratner was so impressed that he cast her as Kitty Pryde in X-Men: The Last Stand.) In her TIFF-featured films, Page delivers two diverse performances: as Arlene in The Stone Angel, she plays a '60s-era prairie rebel who's wrapped up in a forbidden romance with fellow Canuck Kevin Zegers; as Tracey in The Tracey Fragments, she stumbles through a dangerous urban landscape in search of her brother. "Fragments was filmed in 20 days," explains Page. "You don't have time to get intellectual or go inside your head-you just do it." Not wanting to get typecast as "that edgy girl who only reads Rimbaud," Page has a few lighthearted flicks in the can too, including the Dennis Quaid/Sarah Jessica Parker dramedy Smart People and the title role in Jason Reitman's highly anticipated Juno. It might be a daunting pace, but Page isn't complaining. "I think 'How lucky am I, to know exactly what I want to do with my life?""

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
