

■ he new CBC dramedy Being Erica is about a woman revisiting past regrets-something its star Erin Karpluk doesn't know much about. The tenacious 30-year-old actress has always gone after what she wants. When she told her parents that she was leaving her hometown of Jasper, Alta., to attend theatre school, at first they were shocked. Karpluk enrolled in the University of Victoria's theatre program, and four challenging years later she was one of a graduating class of five.

With the help of her parents—who by then had happily but nervously accepted their daughter's determination to be an actress-Karpluk moved to Vancouver, where she quickly landed guest roles on shows like Dark Angel and Jeremiah. Then she got her first big break: a starring role in the racy TV series Godiva's. Karpluk played a Type-A restaurant manager who learned to let her hair down, "Co-starring in a TV show was a master class," says Karpluk. "It's the best education you can get. Acting is such a worthwhile job. It's a form of escapism that lets you get outside yourself, whether it's making people laugh or causing them to say 'Hey, that happened to me."

The show was cancelled after only two seasons, and Karpluk returned to doing guest-star turns on Men in Trees and recurring roles on Bionic Woman and The L Word. Then the role came that she'd been working toward her whole life: her very own series. In Being Erica, which airs in January, Karpluk plays a sassy underachiever who meets a mysterious therapist who can send her back in time to relive and revise her past mistakes-like her decision to lose her virginity in a canoe.

"There are also plenty of fashion flashbacks," says Karpluk, laughing. "I channel horrific Beverly Hills, 90210 clothes." With all its meaty life lessons, the role echoes Karpluk's own path: "The show's not wrapped up in a little bow-it's never that simple. Like in life, nothing rewarding is easy!" BRIONY SMITH
